### **Dr. James F. Jones, Jr.**

assumed the duties of president and Trinity College professor in the humanities of Trinity College on Thursday, July 1, 2004. Jones came to Trinity after serving as president of Kalamazoo College in Michigan since 1996. Jones considers the continued strengthening of the College's ties to the community and growing the endowment among his priorities.



Prior to joining Kalamazoo in 1996, Jones was a professor in the humanities and vice provost of Southern Methodist University and dean of Dedman College of Humanities and Sciences at SMU. From 1975 to 1991, Jones held various academic positions at Washington University in St. Louis, including professor and chair of the Department of Romance Languages and Literature as well as director of the Summer Language Institute in France, Château de la Hercherie, La Croix-en-Touraine. Earlier, he served as preceptor in the Department of French and Romance Philology at Columbia University, and as chair of the Department of Foreign Languages at Woodward Academy in Atlanta.

Jones received his doctorate and master's of philosophy degrees from Columbia University and earned an M.A. from Emory University and a B.A. from the University of Virginia. He holds a Certificat, Degré Avancé, from Ecole des Professeurs de Français à l'Étranger, the Sorbonne.

# Athletic Director Richard Hazelton



In 2006-07, the Trinity athletic program flourished as its varsity teams compiled a stellar .654 (471-249-11) record. The Bantam men's cross country, men's basketball, baseball, women's lacrosse, and women's rowing teams earned berths to the NCAA Division III Championship, while several individual athletes qualified for their respective sport's championships. The women's rowing squad finished a best-ever second at the NCAA National Regatta, while the men's crews captured their third New England Championship title in a row. The Trinity men's squash team captured its ninth consecutive national title with a perfect, 21-0 record and extended the nation's longest winning streak in any collegiate sport to 165 triumphs in a row. Both the men's and women's squash teams won the inaugural New England Small College Athletic Conference crowns, while the Bantam golf team tied for first place in the league championship and finished first among Division III schools in the New England Championship Tournament.

Since 1982, Director of Athletics **Richard J. Hazelton** has taken strides toward creating a winning environment at Trinity College. Competing on the NCAA Division III level, Trinity College sponsors 29 intercollegiate sports, 15 for men and 14 for women. In addition, there are numerous intramural and club sports in which non-varsity athletes can participate. In Hazelton's tenure, the College has constructed an eight-lane, 37-meter swimming pool, 16-seat rowing tanks, a vastly improved fitness room, the nation's top squash facility, two new synthetic turf fields, a rowing boathouse, and numerous improvements to the playing fields and facilities. The College's newest facility, the Koepfel Community Sports Center and Williams Rink, opened last fall to give the Bantam ice hockey teams their first on-campus home ice and provide a fantastic venue for skating and other activities for the campus and Hartford communities.

Hazelton earned his bachelor's degree from Marietta College in 1966 and received a master's of science degree in sports administration from the University of Massachusetts in 1976. Hazelton taught history and was an assistant football coach at Lancaster High School in Ohio from 1969-73 before becoming the head freshman football coach at Amherst College in 1973.

In 1974, Hazelton came to Trinity when he was named an assistant professor of physical education, head track & field coach, and assistant football coach. For eight seasons, Hazelton worked under former Head Football Coach Don Miller, helping Trinity record six winning campaigns and a 42-21-1 record, a .664 winning percentage.

In January 1982, Hazelton assumed the duties of the acting associate athletic director when Karl Kurth took a sabbatical leave. Kurth subsequently retired, and Hazelton was named Trinity's director of athletics. In 1989, Hazelton was promoted to professor of physical education.

During his tenure, Hazelton has been extremely active on various committees throughout the region and the nation. Previously the chairman of the ECAC North/South Hockey Tournament (1987-91) and a member of the ECAC Finance Committee (1993-96), Hazelton has also served on the NCAA Voting Committee (1987-90), the NCAA Football Rules Committee (1996-00), the NCAA Competitive Safeguards and Medical Aspects of Sports Committee (1998-00), and NCAA Committee on Committees (1990-93). In addition, Hazelton was the chairman of the NECAC selection committee for Division III Male Athlete of the Year from 1988-92 (member 1985-93), chairman of the ECAC Division III lacrosse tournament in 1990 and 1996-98, and a member of both the ECAC East-West Hockey Tournament Committee from 1996-99 and the ECAC Ice Hockey Executive Committee (1990-98). Hazelton has been chairman of the ECAC Collegiate Rowing Championship Regatta Board of Stewards (member since 1995) and was a member of both the ECAC Football Executive Committee and the ECAC Marketing Committee. From 1982-1999, Hazelton served as the treasurer for the New England Small College Athletic Conference, and was president in 1990-91 and 2005-06. In 2002, Hazelton was awarded the General Robert Neyland Athletic Director Award by the All-American Football Foundation.

# Athletic Facilities

No fitness and athletics program can be a success without good facilities and equipment. Ours is no exception to that rule. Trinity's sports and athletic programs are enhanced by many top-notch facilities.

Central to all fitness and athletic programs is the Ferris Athletic Center, which houses many of the facilities used by students and athletes. These include our superb squash facility, the Kellner Squash Center, which is a fitting home base for the top men's and women's squash programs in the country. It features 10 international-size courts, two of which are constructed with three glass walls for easy spectator viewing, as well as pyramid-style, amphitheater seating that enables up to 500 spectators to watch matches on all 10 courts simultaneously. Trinity is the only collegiate squash program to use the white ball.

The Ferris Center is also home to the Ray Oosting Gymnasium, with seating for 2,100. It boasts two volleyball courts and two basketball courts and was the site of the men's NCAA Division III basketball regional playoffs in 1995.

Trinity's popular 5,400 square-foot fitness center offers the full complement of fitness machines and state-of-the-art equipment, including selectorized weight machines, treadmills, ellipticals, stairmasters, lifecycles, ergometers, and free weights. Cable television viewing is also available on both the upper and lower levels. The fitness center is open to all students and members of the faculty and staff 16 hours a day, seven days a week.

Other indoor facilities include a multipurpose field house with a 1/10th-mile track and indoor tennis courts, wrestling and exercise rooms, and an auxiliary gymnasium.

Swimmers and divers at Trinity train in our Natatorium, which features a 25-yard, eight-lane stretch pool and a 14-foot deep diving well with a movable bulkhead for water polo. The divers train on one- and three-meter boards and full-size and mini trampolines.

Trinity's rowing program takes advantage of both

Hartford's proximity to the magnificent Connecticut River and an indoor rowing facility housed in the Ferris Athletic Center. The newly renovated Friends of Trinity Rowing Boathouse sits just 15 minutes away in East Hartford. The spacious facility houses 12 eights, seven fours, and numerous smaller boats, as well as men's and women's locker rooms, a study and common room, and a land training area. In the off-season, rowers also stay in shape using our 16-seat rowing tanks and 40 stationary ergometers located in Ferris Athletic Center.

The Jesse/Miller Field, named after two legendary Trinity football coaches, features the College's football field with a modern FieldTurf playing surface, all-weather, six-lane (eight-lane straightaway), 400-meter track, and stadium seating for 6,500 people.

The College's wide range of outdoor facilities, also includes Robin L. Sheppard Field, named after another of Trinity's greatest coaches, a state-of-the-art artificial turf field hockey and lacrosse field with lights, along with two Class A soccer/lacrosse fields, softball and baseball diamonds, eight tennis courts, and four recently renovated intramural fields.

The Koeppe Community Sports Center opened its doors in November 2006, and is a multi-use athletic facility on the southern edge of campus. It features the Albert Creighton Williams '64 Rink, a state-of-the-art 200' x 90' ice arena that serves as home-ice for Trinity men's and women's ice hockey teams, and provides opportunities for faculty, students, and staff to collaborate with the community through academic and athletic mentoring programs. Designed as an extension of the Learning Corridor educational campus, the sports center meets one of SINA's key objectives—providing safe space for recreational opportunities and constructive programming for the community. The Koeppe Center may be the first urban community athletic facility in the country that connects neighborhood families with the resources of a liberal arts college.



# Head Coach MICHAEL PILGER



## HEAD COACH: Michael Pilger

**Michael Pilger** begins his fourth season as head coach of the Trinity College men's soccer team, after posting a 2-10-1 record in 2006. Also an assistant track and field coach and physical education instructor at the College, Pilger came to Trinity from Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland and the Cleveland Crunch of the Major Indoor Soccer League (MISL), where he coached in 2003 and 2002-03, respectively, after highly successful stints as head coach at the University of Rochester and Kenyon College.

Pilger coached the Kenyon men's soccer team from 1988-1991, leading a previously sub-.500 program to the NCAA Division III Championship Tournament in 1990 and 1991. He was selected as the North Coast Athletic Conference (NCAC) Coach of the Year in 1990 and 1991, and the NCAA Division III Great Lakes Region Coach of the Year and National Coach of the Year in 1990 after leading Kenyon to a perfect 18-0 regular season.

Pilger guided the Rochester men's soccer program to University Athletic Association (UAA) Championship titles and NCAA Tournament bids in 1993, 1995, and 1997 and to ECAC Championship titles in 1994 and 2000. He was selected as the UAA Coach of the Year in 1993 and 1997 and the NCAA Northeast Region Coach of the Year in 1995. Pilger posted records of 57-13-3 at Kenyon and 93-55-20 at Rochester in a total of 13 seasons.

Pilger is a 1982 graduate of Boston University with a bachelor's degree in health and physical education, where he was an all-conference and an all-New England player throughout his career. He went on to play professionally in the American Soccer League and the Lusitana American Soccer Association from 1980 to 1986, and was selected to the all-star squad four times.

**Adam Lehmann** enters her fourth season as assistant men's soccer coach Trinity. Lehmann is a graduate of the Rochester Institute of Technology, where he was a four-year starter and an all-regional honoree for the 1995 ECAC Champions. Lehmann resides in Putnam with his wife, Lindsay, and his son, Clayton.

**Julian Gross** begins his first season as assistant men's soccer coach at Trinity. Gross is a 1995 graduate of the University of Rochester, where he was a four-year starter on defense and captain as a senior. **Michael Kruger** also begins his first season as assistant men's soccer coach at Trinity. He is also an assistant men's lacrosse coach for the Bantams.

# 2007 Outlook

The Trinity men's soccer team, under the direction of Head Coach **Michael Pilger**, is eager to begin the 2007 season. The Bantams posted a 2-10-1 record, including no less than seven defeats by a single goal, in 2006. With 18 letterwinners returning the young but experienced Bantam men's soccer team is poised to climb the ladder in the New England Small College Athletic Conference, which is one of the toughest leagues in NCAA Division III soccer.



Junior tri-captain **Phil Yeager (Hinsdale, Ill.)** and sophomore **Jon Graves (Cincinnati, Ohio)** represent the two returning starters in the backfield that allowed just 1.59 goals per game as a unit last fall. The defense also boasts junior **Nick Allen (Seattle, Wash.)** and sophomore **Jason Kulik (Norwell, Mass.)**, who both have significant starting experience. Graves was the rookie of the year for both the soccer and crew teams at Trinity in 2006-07. Junior **Roland Grant (Mount Vernon, N.Y.)** and sophomore **Brandon Ward (Framingham, Mass.)** will provide depth along with a solid group of freshman.

The Bantams boast a pair of proven veteran goalkeepers, as senior tri-captain **Spencer Durland (Rochester, N.Y.)** and junior **Zac Trudeau (Norwell, Mass.)** have combined for 106 saves and five shutouts between them since 2004. Trudeau enjoyed a solid freshman season with a 1.60 GAA in over 950 minutes, while Durland had a team-low 1.24 GAA in 436 minutes last fall. The two will enjoy another pre-season of intense competition for the starting nod in 2007.

At forward, senior tri-captain **Jonathan Hayes (Peabody, Mass.)** is the team leader as well as its top returning scorer with two goals and two assists last season. Junior **Dan Kupper (Wethersfield, Conn.)**, the top high school scorer in Connecticut in 2004, has emerged as a legitimate threat at the forward spot, joining sophomore **Adam Lanza (Glen Cove, N.J.)** as a top candidate to increase the Bantams' scoring punch in 2007. Kupper made a successful move up front from midfield and back in his sophomore year, and Lanza fought his way into the lineup last fall and finished with a goal and an assist. Sophomore **Jack Gandolfo (Basking Ridge, N.J.)**, the team's shortest but also one of its physically strongest players, will be a factor at both forward and midfield, while a host of rookies will look to contribute offensively right away.

Junior **Michael Van Beuren (Spring City, Pa.)** is a steady two-year starter at center midfield with a pair of goals and three assists in his career. A host of skilled and athletic underclassmen have earned varsity experience and should play major roles at the position in 2007. Junior **Nick Cantone (New York, N.Y.)** has two goals and two assists in two years at several positions, while sophomore **Chris Doran (Wayland, Mass.)** played in all 13 games, starting several of them, as a rookie. Senior **Matt Coole (Littleton, Mass.)** and **Colin Gigl (Colonia, N.J.)** and junior **Brice Vallieres (Utica, N.Y.)** have been useful role players throughout their careers and will compete with a deep freshman class for playing time.

## About the NESCAC

Founded in 1971, the New England Small College Athletic Conference (NESCAC) is a group of eleven highly selective liberal arts colleges and universities that share a similar philosophy for intercollegiate athletics. The Conference was created out of a concern for the direction of intercollegiate athletic programs, and remains committed to keeping a proper perspective on the role of sport in higher education.

The formation of NESCAC originated with an agreement among Amherst College, Bowdoin College, Wesleyan University and Williams College first drafted in 1955. Along with these four institutions, Bates College, Colby College, Hamilton College, Middlebury College, Trinity College and Tufts University are sustaining charter members. Connecticut College joined in 1982, bringing the Conference's membership to its current total of 11 institutions.

NESCAC members believe intercollegiate athletic programs should operate in harmony with the educational mission of each institution. The Conference is committed to establishing common boundaries to keep athletics strong but in proportion to the overall academic mission of the member institutions. In pursuit of this mission, the Presidents of each NESCAC institution control intercollegiate athletic policy. Conference tenets are usually more restrictive than those of the NCAA Division III with regard to season length, number of contests and post-season competition.

NESCAC institutions also believe athletic teams should be representative of the entire student body. Thus, admissions and financial policies are consistent with the NCAA Division III policies that prohibit athletic scholarships and award financial aid solely on the basis of need.

In 1999, the NESCAC formally became a playing conference and now sponsors 26 conference championship sports (13 for men and 13 for women). Member schools offer extensive and broad based intercollegiate as well as club and intramural opportunities for both men and women. With member institutions sponsoring an average of nearly 30 varsity programs, NESCAC provides more than 7,500 opportunities for participation in intercollegiate competition at the Division III level. Teams and individuals have achieved great success on both a regional and national level. During the 2006-07 academic year, 49 teams participated in NCAA team championships. NESCAC student-athletes claimed 12 individual national championships and NESCAC teams won five national team championships.
