We are pleased to announce the launch of *Secularism and Nonreligion*, the world's first journal to focus on secularism and the nonreligious. International in scope and interdisciplinary in approach, the journal seeks to advance research into what it means to be secular across societies and cultures, past and present.

Secularism and Nonreligion welcomes submissions of research papers, review articles, and book reviews (in English) primarily from the social scientific disciplines, including psychology, sociology, political science, and economics. At the same time, we are interested in submissions from the humanities (history, religious studies, philosophy) and the hard sciences (biology, neuroscience, computer science). Articles can address secular and nonreligious phenomena at the level of the individual, the institution, or society at large. Articles may also explore secularist ideas, ideology, and political arrangements.

Secularism and Nonreligion will be peer-reviewed, online, and open access, with all articles freely available and downloadable at our website. This format assures faster turnaround; articles can be published as soon as six weeks after submission. It also enables the wide use of color graphics and the potential for audio and video supplemental files. Open access increases the potential for citations and a larger readership.

The first issue will appear in January 2012. Publication standards and procedures can be found on the *Secularism and Nonreligion* site.

The journal is a partnership of the Institute for the Study of Secularism in Society and Culture (ISSSC) at Trinity College in Hartford, Connecticut and the Nonreligion and Secularity Research Network (NSRN), an international and interdisciplinary network of researchers working in the field. *Secularism and Nonreligion* has an international and multidisciplinary editorial board.
