## BLUE, GOLD, AND LIME?

**You’ve probably spotted the bright green bikes around Hartford, but did you realize there’s a new Lime hot spot on Trinity’s campus?** Conveniently propped at Mather Circle—between the Gates Quad and Summit Street—Lime bikes are available for use by local residents, visitors on campus, and Trinity students. And, these handy modes of transportation are managed by Trinity’s own Matthew Rivera '20. Rivera, who also is co-president of the Men of Color Alliance (MOCA) club, is excited to help spread the word about Trinity’s Lime hot spot.

“It’s a really fun and engaging way to be active—even if you’re just going to ride around campus,” said Rivera. “There are some good hills, some good inclines—get those quads going.”

Lime is a bicycle sharing company that started at the University of North Carolina, Greensboro, back in 2017 and rolled into Hartford in mid-June. The dockless bikes, which operate through a GPS system and mobile app, allow riders to pay \$1 for a 30-minute ride.

Rivera explained how the bikes work. “You download the app, which is ‘Lime’ on any app store. You enter your phone number, and they send you a code. You put in the code and your credit card information. Then, you go up to a bike, you scan the QR code on the back of the bike, and then you begin riding. The app will automatically charge you \$1 for every 30 minutes that you ride.”

Rivera, noting the advantages of having Lime bikes at Trinity, added, “I think it’s beneficial to the community and to students because it promotes bike culture on campus.”

## STUDENTS ATTEND STOWE CENTER EVENTS

**Trinity students enrolled in the Community Action Gateway Program started their school year by attending the Harriet Beecher Stowe Center’s events for its annual Stowe Prize and Student Stowe Prizes, awarded to a U.S. author, a college student, and a high school student whose work has made a “tangible impact on a social justice issue critical to contemporary society.”**

Serena Laws, Trinity visiting lecturer in political science, brought her seminar to the Stowe Center’s Action Fair, which featured local social action organizations and a discussion with this year’s prize winners: Matthew Desmond, professor of sociology at Princeton University, for *Evicted: Poverty and Profit in the American City*; Wes Gobar of the University of Virginia for “What It’s Like to Be a Black Student When White Supremacists March in Your College Town”; and Zyahna Bryant of Charlottesville High School for “Change the Name of Lee Park and Remove the Statue.”

The recipients participated in a discussion moderated by WNPR’s Lucy Nalpathanchil. Gobar and Bryant also spoke about their actions in Charlottesville: Bryant’s petition to remove a confederate statue and rename a local park and Gobar’s activism in the face of August 2017’s white supremacist rally. All three prize winners offered ways for Trinity students to think about their own community work during their time in Hartford.

At the Action Fair, Trinity students spoke with community leaders from multiple organizations, met local activists, and learned more about community change happening in Hartford.

## TRINITY CENTER LINKS COMMUNITY PROGRAMS

**Trinity College recently announced the creation of its Center for Hartford Engagement and Research (CHER), bringing together five community engagement programs at the college to work as one group.** The purpose of integrating the programs is to enable them to collaborate more closely and efficiently, strengthening connections among civically engaged members of the Trinity and Hartford communities.

The inaugural director of CHER is Trinity Professor of Educational Studies Jack Dougherty.

The five CHER programs are:

- **Community Learning** (70 Vernon Street, Associate Director Megan Faver Hartline) fosters academic connections with Hartford partners to deepen experiential learning through collaboration and perspective-building relationships;
- **Community Service and Civic Engagement** (Mather Student Center, 300 Summit Street, Director Joe Barber) creates future civic leaders by engaging students in building and maintaining strong, sustainable community partnerships in Hartford and educating and involving them in a range of broader social issues;
- **The Liberal Arts Action Lab** (10 Constitution Plaza in downtown Hartford, Director Megan Brown) investigates problems identified by Hartford partners, with research teams of students and faculty from Capital Community College and Trinity College proposing solutions that will strengthen the city;
- **Trinfo.Café** (1300 Broad Street, Director Carlos Espinosa) bridges the digital divide with a neighborhood internet café that offers computer-literacy training for Hartford youth, adults, small businesses, and nonprofit organizations; provides space to community groups for meetings; and hosts a community garden; and
- **Urban Educational Initiatives** (70 Vernon Street, Director Robert Cotto) connects the college community with nearby public schools, such as Hartford Magnet Trinity College Academy (HMTCA), a grade 6–12 interdistrict magnet school with city and suburban students.
