**WILLIAM P. SCULLY '61, H '18, GP '28, GP '29**  
**The Eigenbrodt Cup**

*The Eigenbrodt Cup, presented by Miss Sallie Eigenbrodt to the college in memory of her brother, David L. Eigenbrodt, Class of 1831, is one of the greatest honors that can be bestowed on a Trinity alumnus/a.*

A recipient of this honor must be an alumnus/a of national or international prominence, who has rendered unusual and significant service to the college. Each recipient receives a medallion symbolizing the honor; the cup itself, inscribed with his or her name, remains at the college. The cup has been awarded annually since 1935 except in 1939, 1944, 1945 and 1963.

The American financier and philanthropist John D. Rockefeller once observed, "The best investment is the one that yields enduring returns for others." Since your graduation from Trinity, you have exemplified this principle—building a distinguished career in finance while making transformative investments in institutions and communities that improve lives.

An economics major, you distinguished yourself both in the classroom and in campus life as a member of Alpha Delta Phi and Trinity's basketball and golf teams. You began your career in institutional sales, ultimately serving as vice president at F. Eberstadt & Co. and later at Smith Barney. As a general partner at Twin Oaks Partners, you demonstrated both foresight and conviction, notably as an early investor in Celgene, a biopharmaceutical company whose groundbreaking therapies have helped countless patients worldwide.

While your professional achievements are considerable, your legacy is equally defined by your extraordinary generosity and leadership in philanthropy. Together with your wife, Marlynn, you have made a profound impact in health care, education, and the arts. Your philanthropy to the Indian River Hospital Foundation helped establish the Scully-Welsh Cancer Center, expanding access to life-saving care. Your enduring support of Trinity-Pawling School has enhanced campus facilities and created scholarship opportunities for generations of students.

Your devotion to Trinity College stands among your most remarkable contributions. With considerable lifetime philanthropic commitments, you have demonstrated an unwavering belief in the college's mission. Your leadership support spans from scholarships that open the doors of a Trinity education to talented students to endowed support for Trinity's men's basketball program to the new Wellness and Recreation Center—now proudly bearing the Scully name. Equally meaningful is your commitment to honoring the legacy of your classmates, including those who served or gave their lives in times of war, ensuring that their memory endures as part of Trinity's living history. Your service as a Presidential Adviser and your participation in milestone events and reunions reflect a deep and abiding connection to your alma mater.

In recognition of your extraordinary contributions, Trinity has previously honored you with the Alumni Medal for Excellence and an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters. Yet your greatest impact is felt not through accolades, but through the opportunities you have created for students and the strength you have helped build within this community.

A devoted husband, father, and grandfather, your family's connection to Trinity continues through future generations, a testament to the enduring bonds you have fostered.

**JOHN S. GATES, JR. '76, P'13**  
**Paul E. Raether '68 Alumni Achievement Award**

*Renamed in honor of Paul E. Raether '68 on the occasion of his 50th Reunion in 2018, this award is given each year by the Trinity College Alumni Association to a member of the alumni body who has, preferably recently, distinguished him/herself in either his/her line of endeavor or beyond the call of normal pursuits. As an award given by the Alumni Association to one of its own members, it is considered to be of a singular purpose, and intended to be clearly distinct from the Eigenbrodt Trophy and the Alumni Medal for Excellence.*

It is most fitting that we recognize you for your extraordinary leadership, entrepreneurial vision, and enduring commitment to Trinity College. Over the course of a distinguished career spanning more than four decades, you have built, led, and transformed organizations that have shaped the landscape of industrial real estate and investment across the nation.

As co-founder of CenterPoint Properties Trust, you helped pioneer the nation's first publicly traded industrial real estate investment trust, guiding the company's growth into a market leader and culminating in its landmark \$3.4 billion acquisition. Your leadership continued through roles at DCT Industrial Trust and beyond, contributing to transformative transactions totaling more than \$12 billion. Today, as founder, chair, and CEO of PortaeCo and executive chairman of TradeLane Properties, you continue to bring vision, discipline, and innovation to complex, large-scale investment strategies.

Your influence extends well beyond the private sector. A respected civic and industry leader, you have served in numerous governance roles, including chairman of the Regional Transportation Authority, leadership positions with the Metropolitan Pier and Exhibition Authority, and service on boards and committees that shape urban planning, infrastructure, and economic development. Your contributions have earned wide recognition, including the ULI Chicago Lifetime Achievement Award.

Equally meaningful is your deep and sustained commitment to philanthropy and education. Through the John & Weezie Gates Charitable Trust and your personal leadership, you have supported a range of organizations dedicated to health, education, public policy, and opportunity. Your connection to the Davis United World College Scholars Program reflects both your personal friendship with Shelby Davis and your belief in expanding access to a transformative education for students from around the globe.

At Trinity, your impact has been profound. As an engaged member of the Board of Trustees and a Presidential Adviser, you have helped guide the College through pivotal moments of growth and planning. **The Gary McQuaid Award**

*The Gary McQuaid Award was established by family and friends in memory of Gary W. McQuaid '64 and in recognition of his leadership as a Trinity undergraduate and his subsequent success in the business world. The award is presented annually by the Trinity College Alumni Association to the alumnus/a who has demonstrated leadership as an undergraduate and success in the business world.*

Casey Tischer, you embody the entrepreneurial spirit, leadership, and commitment to excellence that define the Gary McQuaid Award. You have built a distinguished career in real estate development, marked by vision, discipline, and the ability to bring complex, large-scale projects to life.

As co-founder and owner of Freehold Capital Management, a firm you launched in 2013, you have led the planning, financing, and development of transformative projects across the country. Over the course of your career, you have guided the creation of more than 32,000 housing units and millions of square feet of commercial and retail space, alongside civic and community developments that have strengthened the fabric of the communities they serve.

Prior to founding Freehold Capital Management, you held a senior leadership role at SunCal Companies, where you oversaw underwriting, acquisitions, and capitalization for large-scale, master-planned communities and complex investment portfolios. Earlier in your career, you held executive and development roles with leading firms including NVR, Inc. and Brookfield Residential, building a foundation of expertise that would shape your success as an entrepreneur and industry leader.

Your leadership extends beyond the business world. As a supporter of the SEAL Legacy Foundation, you demonstrate a deep commitment to service—helping provide critical support to Navy SEALs and their families. Your engagement with the Young Presidents Organization further reflects your dedication to leadership, learning, and collaboration.

**The Kathleen O'Connor Boelhouwer '85 Alumni Initiative Award**

*This award, presented by the Trinity College Alumni Association Executive Committee, in memory of Kathleen O'Connor Boelhouwer '85, a Trinity leader, both as a volunteer and as a senior professional, annually honors that alumna or alumnus whose leadership, persuasion and activities advance the engagement of Trinity's alumnae in the college's excellence and reputation. The Boelhouwer Award recognizes that person each year who helps expand the number of women in leadership volunteer roles at Trinity, and/or who helps connect successful alumnae to one another and the college, and/or who helps educate alumnae about their philanthropic power in support of Trinity, and/or who increases alumnae mentoring on and off-campus, and/or helps recognize and celebrate the accomplishments of Trinity women, as graduates or as undergraduates.*

You arrived at Trinity from Pomfret School, drawn to the vibrant community that would shape the course of your life in ways you could not yet have imagined. You majored in psychology, joined Delta Delta Delta, competed on the field hockey team, and expanded your horizons through a study abroad program at Woods Hole through Boston University. After graduating, you pursued a master's degree in teaching at Manhattanville College and began your career in the classroom — teaching prekindergarten at Southfield School in Brookline, Massachusetts, where your patience, warmth, and love of learning found their earliest expression.

Your professional journey then took you into the world of development and philanthropy, where you discovered a natural talent for inspiring generosity in others. You brought that talent to Massachusetts General Hospital and to The Park School in Brookline, where your work in fundraising and community outreach helped impactful institutions do the work that matters most.

Trinity, too, has been a constant in your life. You come from a family for whom this College is not simply an alma mater but a living legacy. Your father, Ted Rorer '65, served with great distinction as a Trinity trustee and continues as a Presidential Adviser; his pioneering work in investment management and his dedication to this institution have long set an example of what it means to give back. Over the course of a distinguished career in international service, you dedicated more than three decades to advancing American diplomacy and fostering cross-cultural understanding as a foreign service officer with the U.S. Department of State. Specializing in public affairs, you brought insight, clarity, and cultural fluency to your work across the globe, strengthening relationships and promoting dialogue in diverse and complex environments.

Your global assignments reflect both the breadth of your expertise and the depth of your commitment. From your service in Uganda to your work in Cluj-Napoca, Romania—where you represented the U.S. Embassy in Transylvania across cultural, political, and consular matters—you consistently elevated the role of public diplomacy. Over the years, you continued to take on leadership roles across a range of international postings, culminating in your service as acting public affairs officer at the American Embassy in Dushanbe, Tajikistan.

In Washington, D.C., your leadership extended to the Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs, where you served as Director of the Alumni Affairs Division, strengthening global networks of exchange program participants and amplifying their impact around the world. Alongside your government service, you have also contributed as a scholar. Armed with a Ph.D. from the University of California, Berkeley, you bring a sociologist's lens to the study of culture and communications, with published work on film, television, and contemporary celebrity.

**SUSANNAH SMETANA KAGAN '91**  
**The Alumni Medal for Excellence**

*This medal is awarded annually to alumni who have made significant contributions to their professions, to their communities, and to Trinity College.*

From your very first days at Trinity, it was clear that you were someone who took ideas seriously. A philosophy major, you were elected to Phi Beta Kappa, served as a President's Fellow, competed on the crew team, edited Trinity Papers, participated in Guided Studies, served in Student Government, and worked as a writing associate — a breadth of engagement that spoke to a restless intellectual energy and a genuine commitment to the community around you.

You went on to earn your J.D. from Georgetown University, where you began your legal training as a staff attorney with the Georgetown Appellate Litigation Clinic, and later built a practice in environmental law at Seyfarth Shaw. Decades later, you returned to graduate study, earning a master's degree in public administration from Columbia University's School of International and Public Affairs — because for you, learning has never been something you leave behind.

Today, you serve as science to policy director for the Urban Climate Change Research Network, a global consortium of scientists, scholars, and practitioners working to equip cities to lead on climate change mitigation and adaptation. It is work that sits at the exact intersection of law, policy, and science — and it reflects a career defined by the conviction that knowledge must be translated into action.

Your commitment to the environment extends far beyond your professional role. You have served as a trustee and board chair of The Nature Conservancy's New York Board and continue to serve as a member of TNC's North America Cabinet and its Trustee Climate Council. You have lent your leadership to the Perfect Earth Project, the Azuero Earth Project, the Central Park Conservancy, and the School of American Ballet — a constellation of causes as varied as they are consequential.

Through all of this, Trinity has remained a constant in your life. You have been a founding member of the Women's Leadership Council, a longtime admissions interviewer, a class agent, and a faithful presence at reunions stretching back thirty years. Since 2020, you have served as a Trinity trustee, contributing to committees spanning academic affairs, enrollment, student life, diversity and equity, and more — and, in your service as vice chair of the Board of Trustees, you have brought to that work the same rigor and care that has defined everything you do.

Your connection to Trinity began the moment you arrived to campus, and it has only deepened in the years since. An economics major, you were a member of the varsity hockey team and spent a semester studying abroad at Trinity's campus in Rome — a formative experience that sharpened the global perspective you would carry into a distinguished career in finance and investment.

After graduating, you went on to earn a master's degree in real estate development from Columbia University before launching a career that would take you across some of the most demanding arenas in finance. You spent five years as an associate at Lehman Brothers, then went on to lead acquisitions and asset management at Arel Capital, where you focused on multifamily real estate across the Northeast and New York City markets. You also served as managing partner of Oyster Capital Group, a real estate development and investment firm you founded in 2007, and as a partner at Mast Capital Partners, an alternative finance company focused on the alcoholic beverage industry. In 2021, you joined Northwood Capital — the investment firm founded by your father, Peter G. Schiff, in 1983 — as a partner alongside your brother Jamie '03, continuing a family tradition of disciplined, long-term investing that has earned the firm a respected place in the industry. Trinity runs deep in your family: your wife, Molly '01, is also a proud alumna of the College.

Your generosity toward Trinity has been sustained and deeply felt. Over more than two decades of giving, you have supported the College in ways both financial and personal — from a major commitment to the Entrepreneurship Center to mentoring students through the Career & Life Design Center, helping build Long Walk Societies, and showing up for Presidential Search meetings, Career Connect events, and Athletic Campaign gatherings. You have served on the Board of Fellows and, most recently, have stepped on the Advisory Board of the Elting Center for Innovation and Entrepreneurship. In July 2025, you were appointed a Charter Trustee — a responsibility you bring to with the full weight of your experience and your affection for this place.

Recipients of this award have helped to foster the long tradition of meaningful, lifelong friendships begun at Trinity and carried through the lives of its graduates.*

You came to Trinity from the Noble and Greenough School in Dedham, Massachusetts, and made the most of every moment on the Hill. As an urban studies major, you brought a practical curiosity to your studies that would serve you well in the decades ahead. You were a member of Alpha Delta Phi, a proud member of Cerberus, and a competitor on the baseball diamond — a combination that speaks to a young man who valued both camaraderie and commitment.

After Trinity, you earned an MBA from Babson College and built a distinguished career as one of the country's most respected executive search practitioners. In 1991, you co-founded Kiradjieff & Goode with your wife, Laura — a true partnership in every sense of the word. Over the decades that followed, the firm earned a strong reputation as a leading super-boutique search practice, specializing in board- and C-suite-level placements for organizations seeking exceptional leadership. In 2017, the firm merged with KLR Executive Search Group, a testament to the standard of excellence you and Laura had built together.

Your commitment to community extends beyond the boardroom. You have been a steadfast supporter of Noble and Greenough School, where both of your children, Rick and Eliza, are graduates — continuing a tradition of loyalty that seems to come naturally to you.

And through it all, Trinity has remained close to your heart. You have attended your 20th, 25th, 30th, 35th, 40th, and 45th Reunions, and your service to the College spans more than three decades — from the Boston Club Committee in your early years as an alumnus to the Class Executive Board, to Reunion Gift and Class Committees that you have returned to again and again.
