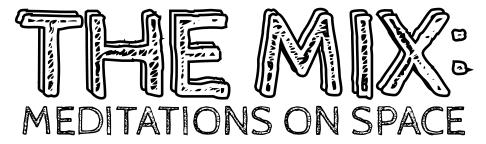

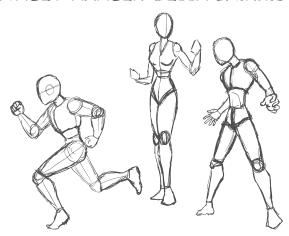

DIRECTOR'S NOTE

Welcome to The Mix: Meditations on Space, a program of new and historic works created by students, faculty, and guest artists to celebrate the 60th anniversary of the Austin Arts Center at Trinity College. On May 15, 1965, then college president Albert C. Jacobs presided over a day-long Dedication Ceremony that, along with speeches by dignitaries and performances by the glee club, offered audiences time to explore the building and its possibilities. It is with this in mind that the first part of this evening's production invites each of you to create your own journey of discovery through these halls.

In an archived copy of the printed program from that illustrious day, these words stand out: "The power of ideas, which is the major concern of a center of learning such as Trinity College, exerts its full impact through those most human of man's achievements, the arts. No channel from within ourselves is more broad and deep..." It goes on to proclaim that when we step into a new creation, we "... breathe in with deeper delight the accustomed atmosphere of decisions and habits that at times grows stifling." The works you will encounter this evening come from across each of the past six decades, and then some. They are the result of many different approaches to creative inquiry. They embody our celebration of foundations and traditions, as well as our responsibility to probe and interrogate them anew. In this spirit, please join us in looking again at this place, its many spaces, with openness toward new imaginings that will unfold here over the next sixty years.

It feels important to reflect on how our context in 2025 is notably different from it was for our predecessors — it was only a few months after this dedication ceremony that the landmark 1965 Voting Rights Act was passed, and only a few years later that women students were admitted to this institution. When we consider the experience of constant change, and the privileges we have today to meet new challenges facing liberal arts institutions like Trinity, let alone those we encounter in the larger world, I find myself buoyed by the innumerable ways this center has functioned, and still functions, as a place for research and discovery at the heart of

our campus. To quote AAC's Executive Director, Deborah Goffe, there is "a long legacy of cool" here at Trinity. And yet the incredible variability of perspectives, histories, and artistic potential each of us represents, a fraction of which you'll experience this evening, remains a kind of renewable resource we have yet to fully leverage as an institution, as a society. And so. this anniversary moment asks every member of our community to join in a process of engaging with this and other spaces we inhabit, as if for the first time. In what ways are we, each of us, reclaiming our innocence, with clear-eyed intention and curiosity, to embolden one another through our most creative, integrated capacities, our motional-cognitivesensorial-imaginative faculties, toward the kind of rigorous play that bridges disciplinary divides, yields new knowledge, new sensitivity, and reveals ever more questions to explore? Art practice remains a birthright to all, and we do well to preserve and nurture its place at the center of our enterprise here at Trinity and beyond.

> While he was not the first composer to write for ensembles made up exclusively of percussion instruments, John Cage was certainly one of the most influential. Through percussion, his aim was to expand the sonic boundaries of music, "organized sound." and to challenge himself to transcend the limits of his own aesthetic sense.

> The piece was scored for radios because Cage had absolutely no idea what sounds would come from their speakers. This was one of his first works that used chance operations to determine structural elements. His idea was to liberate music from his own taste, his concerns and his ego. Radios were used in his later pieces and the idea was picked up by other composers,

such as Karlheinz Stockhausen and even the Beatles in Revolution No 9.

This embrace of indeterminacy was commonplace in the arts during the early 50s. As Cage inked random notes onto manuscript paper, Jackson Pollock was splattering house paint on canvas and William Burroughs was folding the pages of magazines to throw up unimaginable combinations of words.

Hilary Clark (Slant Board) is a dancer/dramaturg/teacher/choreographer working in experimental dance and theater since 1998. She received a New York Dance and Performance Award, a Bessie, in 2008, for sustained achievement. She has toured nationally and internationally in the work of Tere O'Connor, Miguel Gutierrez and Powerful People, luciana achugar, and Young Jean Lee, among others. In 2023, she choreographed "Night Keeper," written and directed by Aaron Landsman, at the Chocolate Factory Theater. Hilary is in an ongoing collaboration

with Nicole Daunic in which they developed MAT(T)ER, an ongoing creative process of noticing, documenting, and moving with more-than-human etchings, scores, and traces. Their work has been supported by a 2024 Chocolate Factory Theater creative residency, LMCC RehearsalWeek, and Another Audience, at Black Hole Hollow in Arlington, VT. She recently served as the dramaturg for Julana May's "Optimistic Voices." Her work as a performer and choreographer is documented in Jenn Joy's book The Choreographic (MIT, 2014). Clark has taught at Williams College, Northern Vermont State College, Connecticut College, Bennington College, Chunky Move (Australia), Portland Institute of Contemporary Art, Pacific NorthWest College of Art (Oregon), Seattle Festival for Dance Improvisation at Velocity Dance Center (Seattle, WA) and Movement Research (NYC). She currently teaches dance at the Greater Hartford Academy of the Arts halfday program, is the owner of Citrine Pilates & Wellness, and received an MFA from Bennington College.

Judy Dworin (My Body, My Body) is a dance/theater artist and educator who is committed to inspiring social action through her work with the Justice Dance Performance Project (JDPP), which she founded in 1989. Performance is an underpinning to all JDPP's work on stage, in schools and in carceral institutions. Judy has created work with the JDPP ensemble over the past 36 years that has been presented in CT, NYC, New England and internationally. Judy is a Professor Emerita in Theater and Dance at Trinity College where she established the dance program and chaired the Theater and Dance Department for many years. She received an honorary doctoral degree of Fine Arts from the College in 2020. An article that Judy wrote about her work at York Correctional Institution is featured as part of Jonathan Shailor's book Performing New Lives: Prison Theater. All Judy's work is based on the belief that the arts are foundational to our understanding of what it is to be human.

Brayden Esler '27 (Slant Board) is a junior double-majoring in Theater & Dance and Psychology. He has performed in over 40 theater and musical theater productions throughout Connecticut and New York City. Some of his favorite prior roles include Emmett Forrest (Legally Blonde), Mark Cohen (Rent), Marius (Les Misérables), Bart Simpson (Mr. Burns), Tobias (Sweeney Todd), Billy Elliot (Billy Elliot), and Puck (A Midsummer Night's Dream). Brayden is also involved with The Pipes a cappella group on campus.

Alexa Melonopoulos Fleury (My Body, My Body) began her dance training with Estelle Jones and went on to earn a BA in Dance from Hofstra University and an MA in Dance in Higher Education and Administration from New York University. As a performer, Alexa has worked with choreographers including Eleo Pomare, Remy Charlip, Rosalind Newman, Robin Becker, Stormy Brandenberger, Lance Westergard, Lili Weiss, John Mead, and Ching Wen Yeh. She has been affiliated with numerous professional companies, among them Washington Square Repertory Dance Company, Sonia Plumb Dance Company, Works/Laura Glenn Dance, and as a longtime member of the Justice Dance Performance Project (Judy Dworin).

Simone Forti (Slant Board, Creator) is a dancer, artist, and writer based in Los Angeles. Her early Dance Constructions were influential in the reinvention of dance that took place in New York in the 1960s and '70s. Over the years Forti has developed movement vocabularies based on studies of animal movements, the dynamics of circling, and the synergy between moving and speaking, as in her improvisational "News Animations." Forti has performed internationally at venues including the Louvre Museum in Paris and The Museum of Modern Art in New York, the latter of which added her Dance Constructions to its collection in 2015.

Leslie Frye-Maietta (Slant Board) is Mother to three, Mover and Maker who embraces an entrepreneurial spirit, practicing radical versatility in all things dance and life. This philosophy has led to a successful career in both Concert and Commercial dance spaces on an international to local scale. Leslie's choreographic work has been presented from Berlin to Boston, and her teaching continues to be equally as distinct. She has worked with Mia Michaels, George Faison, Hope Boykin, Mary Cochran, Adele Myers, Daniel Gwirtzman, Paul Matteson, and Deborah Goffe, to name a few. Body House, The Collective is a project-based platform, a house of mentorship, a home for deep connection, and a hub for Leslie's rich, collaborative creative research - rooted in the empowerment of women of diverse backgrounds, producing socially conscious performance. Additionally, Leslie is the Founder/Owner of Body House Integrative Fitness in Avon, CT, a space dedicated to providing wellness through movement, specializing in Gyrotonic exercise, core rehabilitation, and more.

Leslie has held faculty positions, performed, and had her choreographic work commissioned at numerous area universities and private institutions including; UMass Amherst, Smith College, Amherst College, Mt. Holyoke College, Salve Regina University, Keene State, Connecticut College, The University of Hartford, Hartt School, Miss Porter's School, The Greater Hartford Academy of the Arts, University of St. Joseph, Hollins University, and The American Dance Festival. Leslie is currently Visiting Faculty in Theater and Dance at Trinity College.

Vicente Gil '27 (Slant Board, Jazz Ensemble, A Non-Violent Inquiry into the Pillars of Rolling) hails from Philadelphia and majors in neuroscience. The artist's keen attention to precision in writing leaves them wondering about a career in scientific writing. Vicente enjoys rock climbing, playing music with friends, and napping in the sun.

Abigail Gomes '28 (Never Alone) is very excited to take part in The Mix! Abby is a sophomore and is planning to double major in Music and Computer Science. She has previously taken on roles such as Kelsi Nielsen in High School Musical, Mother Abbess in Sound of Music, and Scratchy in Mr. Burns: A Post-Electric Play. On campus, she is a part of the Musical Theatre Club, Chapel Singers, and the Trinity Pipes. She has recently performed with Scapegoat Garden in Hartford CT, Portland ME, & Brunswick ME, iterations of Liturgy|Order|Bridge (2023 & 2024). Juanita has choreographed several musicals, including Newsies (2024), the Lion King Jr (2024), and High School Musical Jr. (currently). She currently dances with professional companies; IMMIX Dance Project and Subira Vs. Movement, both of which are located in Hartford. CT.

K.J. Holmes (Slant Board, Teacher) is a dance artist, actor, vocalist, writer, and teacher, and has been practicing improvisational forms as process and performance since 1981. She has collaborated with Simone Forti and Steve Paxton, and is very influenced by Lisa Nelson's Tuning Score, Body Mind Centering® (Bonnie Bainbridge Cohen), Ideokinesis (Andre Bernard), Meisner acting work (Terry Knickerbocker), voice and singing (Richard Armstrong, Barbara Maier Gustern, and Samita Singha, among others). She works extensively both nationally and internationally, and teaches at NYU/Experimental Theatre Wing and Movement Research in NYC. A member of Simone Forti and Troupe, K.I. assisted her Dance Constructions at MoMA and continues to teach her work. Her most recent performances have been in the work of filmmaker/artist Matthew Barney. dancer/writer Karinne Keithley Seyers, music video of Mitski, as well as her own solo, 900 Bees are Humming. She is currently conducting a new ensemble piece, Blu/print, with composer/instrumentalist Henry Threadgill, through a grant from the NY State Dance Force.

He has taught at Bard College, Marymount Manhattan College, Sarah Lawrence College, University of Washington and Cornish College of the Arts, among others. For his own work, he has received choreographic commissions and residencies across the U.S., in Scotland, Norway, Germany, Cyprus, Mexico, China, Ukraine, and Lithuania. He was Associate Director (2017-2020) at Bearnstow, a summer arts retreat in Maine, and member of the Board of Directors at Triskelion Arts in Brooklyn, NY (2010-201). He currently serves as President of the Board of Directors at the Connecticut Dance Alliance, a nonprofit

dedicated to promoting all forms of dance across the state. He is Associate Professor in Trinity's Department of Theater and Dance and currently developing a new project on anatomies of flow.

Aarti Lamberg '24 (My Body, My Body) is the 2025-2026 Centennial Arts fellow for the Justice Dance Performance Project. She graduated summa cum laude from Trinity College in 2024 with a human rights major and a community action minor. During her time at Trinity, she choreographed and performed in several dance concerts. She is passionate about utilizing dance as a catalyst for social change and advocacy. She is a member of the Justice Dance Performance Project ensemble and the Tess Saoirse Dance Company.
