The Greenberg Center at Trinity College Partners with The Official Royal House of Sori to Preserve Global Legacies and Cultural Histories

Hartford, Conn. — November 2025 — The Greenberg Center for the Study of Religion in Public Life at Trinity College has announced a new partnership with The Official Royal House of Sori (TORHOS) and its affiliated nonprofit, the Root Nine Foundation and Institute (R9), led by Her Royal Highness Princess Karen Wright-Sori Brengettsy-Chatman.

This collaboration seeks to advance historical scholarship, cultural preservation, and public education by uncovering and documenting the stories of Prince Abdulrahman Ibrahim ibn Sori and other lost, forgotten, or undiscovered civilizations and royal lineages spanning Africa, Southwest Asia, and North America.

The partnership's inaugural initiative, *The Whispering Voices Project*, will launch during the 2025–2026 academic year. The project will identify, catalog, and digitize archival materials from across Connecticut related to Prince Abdulrahman, while also collecting oral histories from his descendants and other historically connected communities. The effort will serve as a model for future research initiatives exploring broader global histories of cultural continuity, religion, and leadership.

Through this partnership, the Greenberg Center, TORHOS, and R9 will:

- Promote academic and public understanding of African royal, diasporic, and cross-cultural histories.
- Support interdisciplinary research and global cultural exchange.
- Encourage community engagement through lectures, exhibitions, and collaborative scholarship.

“The Greenberg Center is honored to collaborate with Her Royal Highness Princess Karen Wright-Sori Brengettsy-Chatman and her team in this meaningful endeavor,” said Leslie Ribovich, Director of the Greenberg Center. “Together, we aim to illuminate histories that have shaped Connecticut history yet remain underrepresented in public consciousness. We are especially excited to give students the opportunity to participate in this research.”
