Comparative Study of a village in Sicily vs. Elizabeth Street in New York



"Here were myriads of human beings, stifling in boxes arranged like drawers in a bureau, with holes to look out upon the opposite boxes and the roaring 'elevated.' Those who were at home hung out of the windows in as few garments as were decent; while the long seething bare canons of brick, paving stone and asphalt were swarming with the long to the long and amusement . . . 


Figure 1-1. Sambuca di Sicilia. "Approaching the city, however, the scene changes; . . . from the distance of about a mile, more or less according to the importance of the city, the traveller finds himself in the middle of an oasis of olives, almonds, grape vines, prickly pears, and, below, in the bottom of the valley, he sees the dark green leaves of the citrus gardens. Entering the city — here there are almost no villages — he must pass the long streets of low houses, each made up of a single ground-floor room, each pressed up against the next, without windows and with only a single entryway. . . . These are the houses of peasants." (Sidney Sonnino, 1 Contadini in Sicilia, Inchiesta in Sicilia, vol. 2 (Florence: Valecchi, 1974), p. 11).
