BOLLYWOOD AND BEYOND

An Introduction to Popular Indian Cinema

The course provides an introduction to Indian cinema, with a focus on popular Hindi cinema from WWII to the present. For over fifty years "Bollywood" has dominated India's domestic market and made a huge impact in markets and cultures around the world: China and other Asian countries, the former Soviet Union, Africa, the Middle East, Greece, and the diasporic audiences of the Caribbean, the United Kingdom and North America. The keys to this global popularity lie in the specific contexts - aesthetic, cultural, social, and historical - within which Bollywood films are produced and received. Understanding Bollywood cinema requires a journey through the films into Indian aesthetics, culture, society and history, a journey that will provide you with a unique set of perspectives on the contemporary world.
